Most of the over-30 crowd has heard the hymn during an altar call, and many of us heard the Holy Spirit's low whisper while the congregation was singing. We're in good company. Even Billy Graham gave his life to Christ to the tune of *Just as I Am*, and then used the old familiar hymn at his crusades all around the world.

"Just as I am" is a simple acknowledgement of our lack of qualification for God's gift of salvation. We can't rub off the spots or work off our debt, but when we come confessing our need for the Lamb of God to "cleanse each spot," we are leaning into God's promise to cleanse, pardon, and receive us. We can also cooperate with the Holy Spirit as He reveals the dark places that remain. As we grow in gratitude for the acceptance God as given to us in Christ Jesus, our love for Him will grow as well as our motivation to be holy as He is holy.

**The Point:** We are called to **holy living**, not *by* our works, but *by responding* in obedience to God's saving work of grace given to us **in Christ Jesus**.
